Department Scholarship, Helen Klimek Student Scholarship, Maryann K Murtha Memorial Scholarship, Raymond T Wellington Jr Memorial

1 Awarded annually

A scholarship of \$1,000 shall be awarded to an eligible candidate planning to further his/her higher education.

10 Awarded annually (1 within each district)

National American Legion Auxiliary Children of Warriors National President's Scholarship

Applications must be completed <u>online only</u> by March 1st <u>https://www.legion-aux.org/Scholarships/Children-of-Warriors</u>

Three \$5,000 scholarships are awarded annually per division

Candidates for this award shall be direct descendants of veterans who served in the United States Armed Forces during eligibility dates for membership in The American Legion: April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918; and any time after December 7, 1941. Applicants must be in their senior year of high school. This is a scholarship to attend an accredited institution of higher education.



National American Legion Auxiliary Non-Traditional Student Scholarship

Applications must be completed online only by March 1st <u>https://www.legion-aux.org/Scholarships/Non-Traditional-Student</u>

One \$2,000 scholarship is awarded annually per Auxiliary division.

Applicants must be: A current member in good standing of The American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, or Sons of The American Legion, must have held membership for the two preceding years (2022 and 2023), and be a paid member for the current (2024) membership year, OR A veteran who served in the United States Armed Forces and was honorably discharged, OR The spouse of an active duty servicemember or a veteran who was honorably discharged. As well as a non-traditional student returning to the classroom after some period in which their formal education was interrupted, OR a non-traditional student beginning their education at a later point in life.



National American Legion Auxiliary Spirit of Youth Scholarship for Junior Members

Applications must be completed online only by March 1st https://www.legion-aux.org/Scholarships/Spirit-of-Youth

National Headquarters will award each state/department winner a \$1,000 scholarship (47 scholarships total). From the state/department scholarship winners, the national Education Committee will select 5 winners (1 per division) for a \$5,000 scholarship.

Candidates for this award shall be/shall have been Junior members of the American Legion Auxiliary, have held membership in the American Legion Auxiliary for the past three consecutive years, and must be a paid member for the current membership year. Applicant must continue their membership in the American Legion Auxiliary during the scholarship period. Applicants must be in their senior year of high school.



National American Legion Auxiliary Junior Member Loyalty Scholarship

One Application per unit may be submitted. Application may be submitted online or downloaded and submitted March 1st to Unit, March 5th to County, March 15th to Department Chairman

Two \$2500 scholarships will be awarded in each division.

Candidates for this award shall have been Junior members of the American Legion Auxiliary, held membership in the American Legion Auxiliary for the past three consecutive years and be a paid member for the current membership year. Applicant must continue their membership in the American Legion Auxiliary during the scholarship period. This scholarship is intended for the traditional college student with no interruption in education, who is at least in the first semester of college or technical school but not yet attained a bachelor's degree.

THE CERULLO MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

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There is no limit to the number of applications that any one Squadron, Post or Auxiliary Unit may wish to submit. Applications are mailed to all registered Squadrons; additional applications may be photocopied. Completed applications must be returned to Detachment Headquarters, ATTN: SONS Coordinator, by April 30th.

Candidates for this award must be MEMBERS in good standing in The American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, or Sons of The American Legion in New York State and are in their senior year or are graduates of an accredited High School.

- Participate in American Education Week, held every November.
- Recognize school administrators and staff with special treats.

Committee Ideas



- Encourage schools to participate in Month of the Military Child and Purple Up! Day in April to honor their students who are military children and sponsor a Purple Up! Day on April 15 in your school by providing purple items for students to wear.
- Present the Military Child Table at your school, unit meeting, or at your post.
- Sponsor a party for the military children in your school.
- Work with your American Legion post to participate in Veterans in Community Schools. Ask the teachers to have their students make cards for the veteran. Work with the teachers to prepare students to ask questions of the veteran.

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

- You can't do it all
- Avoid a domineering leadership style
- Make it a priority to work well WITH your group

- Don't scare or overwhelm them!
- Start mentoring
- Prepare a notebook w/expectations
