## Department President's Message......Karen D. St. Hilaire

Here we are in April, three fourths through the administrative year. The Department Leadership team has completed all sixty-two county visits. It has been amazing journey. We were even able to visit the Burlington Legion Post in Canada. You can view all pictures the Department Commanders Aide Chip Rayno took. I have been asked many times what's the best place / thing we have done so far? My answer has been we have visited may American Legion Posts and sites, but the best thing is meeting the grassroot members of the American Legion Family.

Our latest membership report shows the Department of NY is in 16<sup>th</sup> place of the 52 Departments, with 33,410 members paid for 89.3% of our goal. We are still 301 members short of last year's total paid members. There are still thirty-eight units with zero to ten members paid. I am asking all Unit and County membership chairpersons to contact these units and assist them with getting members to submit dues. It is not too late to retain members. These units may also need help filing forms to turn in their charters.

Now is the time to review all department committee awards, including the Department President awards. Take note of the required form including cover page, numbers of words and information needed and deadline dates. Also make sure you submit it to the correct person. Many awards are not presented each year, due to lack of entries.

Reminder following unit elections in May, county elections in June and District elections in July, you need to submit a complete list of officers and committee chairs to the Department Secretary at the Department Headquarters office. Send this list in even if the officers remain unchanged. You must also notify the department of the amount you charge for dues; this is the Blue Form which is due no later than May 1<sup>st</sup> 2024 to the Department Headquarters office, otherwise the dues notice National sends out will be incorrect.

Reminder the American Legion Homecoming honoring Department Commander, President and Detachment Commander will be held May 17-19, 2024. At Vernon Downs Hotel And Casino.

Dinner will be held on Saturday May 18 at 6 pm. Cost is \$60.00 person .There will be a free band in the casino Friday and Saturday night, Harness racing, and a hospitality room for overnight guests and those attending dinner. Reminder Department convention will be held in Niagara Falls July 16 -19, 2024. Registration and preconvention meetings will be on Tuesday, sessions will be held Wednesday and Thursday.

Members may travel home after the session or stay until Friday; Friday post-convention meeting will be held for incoming officers and committee chairs. Details will be mailed to Unit Presidents in Convention Call.

Hear yea, Hear yea, come one, come all to the annual American Legion Auxiliary Department of NY convention being held in Niagara Falls, NY July 15-19, 2024. The Auxiliary headquarters hotel is Hyatt Place at 310 Rainbow Blvd. Cost of rooms is \$169, INCLUDING parking and breakfast. The committee has been told by past, present and future department officers that both the bed and pillows are great sleep-inducing items. If you are interested, the other hotels where rooms are reserved for this convention are the Holiday Inn (SAL), the Sheraton (Legion) and the Seneca Niagara Resort and Casino (overflow for all hotels). Room reservations should be made online at:niagarfallusa.com/nyslegion, the site is up and running. A tax-exempt form is required.

Registration is scheduled for Tuesday 3-6, at the conference center.

The annual state dinner will be held on Wednesday night at the conference center. There are three choices to pick from a pasta dish, beef, and chicken. Cash bar will open at 6pm, with dinner at 7pm. The cost of the dinner is \$49.00 per person. Dinner forms will be included in the convention call.

Additional information such as times and place for both pre- and post-convention meetings will be announced in the convention call.

During any free time, there are always things to do and see. Of course there is the mighty Falls itself, it is within walking distance of the hotel, viewing can take place from the Niagara Falls State Park, or from atop the Observation tower. Perhaps walking across the bridge to view the Falls from the Canadian side is your choice, this requires either a passport or an enhanced driver's license. If you are feeling really brave get up close, a ride - the Maid of the Mist, or tour the Cave of the Winds. If shopping is more to your liking there is the Factory Outlet Mall that has over 200 stores and you can take the Niagara shuttle for FREE, to and from all hotels. History buffs might enjoy a tour of Old Fort Niagara and perhaps a Niagara wine trail would be enjoyable.

The most important idea is that you come to the convention, to meet new people, get new ideas and reacquaint yourself with old friends.



## ----Message from the Department Office----

• Convention Call will be emailed to the last known Unit and County President in May and will also be sent in the mail via USPS. If you receive it in error, please pass it along to the unit and/or county president and please share it with your members.

- Newsletters E-mail copies of the Newsletter are available to any member wanting a free copy. Please e-mail anyone of us at the office with a valid email and we will get you on the list. If you do not have email and someone in the unit/county would like to receive it on your behalf, please let us know so we can add them to the list. If you receive a copy of the newsletter via email, please share it with the members in your unit or county. Mailed copies of the Newsletters are available at the cost of \$15.00 per year.
- All Department issued checks must be deposited within 90 days. Going forward the treasurer will not reissue checks that were not deposited in a timely manner.
- All checks sent to the office should be made out as follows: American Legion Auxiliary, Department of New York and indicate in the memo line what it is for. Also, please remember to sign the check.
- All donations should be sent to the department office and not the committee chair.
- When submitting a donation form please indicate what unit or county it is.
- National pulled rosters and 2025 membership cards. This means that any changes, new members, rejoins and transfers made after April 1<sup>st</sup> will not be reflected on the Unit's 2025 membership cards and rosters. This does NOT mean we will stop accepting 2024 dues. We process renewals/new members ALL year; please do not hold onto it until the Fall. If a member's dues were not paid for 2024, 2023 they are now considered expired for 2025 rosters and will not appear on the 2025 roster and will not have a printed membership card. When paying their dues, you will have to give them a handwritten card for 2025.
- The 2025 Unit Data form for renewal notices were mailed to Unit Presidents in early March. It is available as a fillable PDF to download off of our website under the membership tab. Make sure you are using the 2025 form only. Please complete the entire form and do not leave anything blank. This form is due back to the Department Office no later than May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024. Please remember that the 2025 dues will be available to pay July 2024. If your current rate is not sufficient, please make sure your unit notifies all members that there will be dues increase proposed for the unit, when the meeting will be held, etc. Please make sure you follow your unit Constitution & Bylaws regarding notice to all members.
- The 2025 per capita for Department and National for senior members is \$28; the junior per capita is \$6.25. If you do not submit your form by May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024 and your current rate is below the amounts above, the Unit will not receive a portion of the per capita for 2025. Once the rates are locked and they need to be changed, National will charge a processing fee.
- At this time, the current year (2024) dues have to be paid first before back dues. This now includes 2023 dues.
- Please do not send DD214's/active-duty documentation into the office with applications. Once the Post Adjutant/Officer signs the application (ORIGINAL SIGNATURES NO PHOTOCOPIES) and the membership chair (ALA) verifies all supporting documents, return the supporting documents to the member. The office only needs the completed signed application with the dues and transmittal. Remember if the veteran is living, he/she MUST BE A CURRENT PAID MEMBER IN THE AMERICAN LEGION. Remember to check which era the veteran served and the relationship of the veteran to the ALA applicant. Please circle the appropriate relationship to the veteran.

- Applications need to be complete and legible otherwise they will be returned to the unit membership chair. New members' address needs to be complete. No abbreviations on city/town. All membership applications must be presented to the unit membership chairman with the proper documentation prior to being submitted to the office for processing.
- Membership chairs if your unit members move, change any contact information, phone numbers, emails, etc., please send the change to the Department office or if you have unit write or unit full, please make the appropriate changes so the information is updated in a timely manner. This also pertains to unit President, Membership Chair and Unit Treasurer.

I Recently attended the Oratorical Banquet and Contest that was held on March 1st and 2nd at the Crowne Plaza-Desmond Hotel in Albany, NY. There were five contestants with four females and one male. These young teens are the future leaders of tomorrow. What an impressive job each contestant did reciting an Article of the Constitution from memory. For the first part, the contestants delivered their prepared orations for eight to ten minutes each. For the second part of the contest, I didn't know that the contestants had to memorize five different Articles from the Constitution and be prepared to deliver a three-to-five-minute oration on whichever one was selected the morning of the contest. Before the second part commenced, The American Legion Department Commander, Timothy Collmer, picked an envelope from one of the judges and read it aloud to the crowd and judges. Then, one of the judges notified the first contestant of what the title was, and they had five minutes to prepare. Each contestant thereafter was notified and allowed five minutes to prepare before delivering their oration. Could you do that? I know I Couldn't. I will say the deliberation of who the winner was a very tight race as it took the judges almost two hours to deliver the results. I mean the chairperson looked out to the audience and was overwhelmed with joy by the enormous crowd of American Legion Family supporters. Grant Gillman of Fifth District, Jefferson County and Hannah Brundage of Eighth District, Orleans County took home Fifth and Fourth Place with \$2,000 scholarships, Orianna Cotton of Fourth District, Franklin County took third place with a \$2,500 scholarship, Maureen Kennedy of Tenth District, Suffolk County took second place with a \$4,000 scholarship, and Nia Gooden of Ninth District. Westchester County took first place with a \$6,000 scholarship. Nia will go on to compete in the National Oratorical finals that will be held on May 17-19 at Hillsdale College in Michigan. The State of New York wishes her good luck!

The Annual American Legion Department of New York Junior Shooting Sports Program Three Position Air Rifle Championship competition took place on February 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> at The American Legion James Harvey Spire Post 787 in Cicero, NY. There was a good support of the American Legion Family and parents. This year there were one hundred and thirty-two registered shooters sponsored from nine American Legion Posts across New York State. Of those registered, sixty-five shooters were able to compete in a four-person team match. The shooters had to shoot in three different positions to include standing, prone and kneeling. The shooters over the last few years have been primarily dominated by females. LeRoy Post of Westchester County Ninth District took third place in medals, Warsaw Post of Wyoming County Eighth District took second place in medals, and Middletown Post of Orange County Ninth District took first place in medals presented.

Bills and resolutions are referred to committees which debate the bill before sending it on to the whole chamber, the House, the Senate and signed by the President.

Last session three very critical bills have passed the House of representatives

#### 1. The Elizabeth Dole Home Care Act of 2023 (HR 542)

The Elizabeth Dole Home Care Act exemplifies Sen. Elizabeth Dole's passion for supporting veterans and their caregivers by expanding access to home and community-based care programs for veterans, increasing support for non-institutional care, assessing VA's caregiver and long-term care programs and more. Caregivers help veterans maintain their independence and stay in their own homes in their own communities for as long as possible as they age.

The Home Act of 2023 (H.R. 3848)

To protect consumers from price gouging of residential rental and sale prices.

#### 2.The Cope Act (H.R. 3581

Specifically, the bill authorizes the VA to award grants to implement, coordinate and enhance mental health counseling, treatment, and support for family caregivers of veterans participating in the family caregiver program. Additionally, the Government Accountability Office must report on the provision of mental health support to caregivers of veterans. The bill also requires the VA to annually survey the security at VA facilities.

**3.The second FY24 (Fiscal Year 2024),** appropriations package passed by the House last week was a win for the American people. One of the most significant provisions was the hire of 22,000 border patrol agents to secure our nation's southern border. That's in-line with what would be provided in H.R. 2, the Secure the Border Act, which the House passed last May. With border crossings at record highs, our border patrol is understaffed and overwhelmed. They need help and we need relief.

It is critical for the Senate to pass these bills.

Thank you to all members who have contributed to support the Legislative program in contacting our elected officials to pass these critical bills in support of our Veterans families, communities, and our nation. After all, our elected officials do the bidding of the American Citizens, not their own agenda. Let our voices continue to be heard loud and clear.
